

FIRE DEPARTMENT NEWS

January's board meeting of the Picture Rocks Fire Department, PRFD, dealt with the question that many citizens have regarding the LED announcement board on Sandario Road. State law requires that any announcements be directly related to fire department business, the mission of the fire department, or public safety. So, even though there is contract language that they accept any submission, at this time that language is pre-empted by state law.

Go to the PRFD website at picturerocksfire.org and you will see a form to submit announcements. You can request that they use your message, but if the content does not fit the criteria above, they will not display it. Many requests will fit the public safety requirement. The form also asks how many seconds you want to light up your message, so you can ask for a slower speed.

The website will carry monthly board minutes after they are approved at the subsequent month's board meeting. Expect to see December 2015 minutes soon.

An update on Firefighter Chris Farmer and his family – they celebrated the first birthday of their little girl. You might remember that she was born with a serious medical condition. She spent the first eight months in the hospital but is now able to come home several days a week. Residents continue to wish the best for her and the whole family.

Another agenda item was a report from the independent auditor that found just a few areas for improvement, but a much better billing procedure and improved policies and procedures. PRFD will end the use of the old fire station on Sandario Road by the end of February. There are no plans to put anything else there at this time.

END OF LIFE CARE PLANNING WORKSHOPS

Free, interactive workshops that guide you through advance care planning for End of Life Care will be offered at the Picture Rocks Community Center in February.

Talking about end of life choices can be difficult. This class will empower attendees with words to discuss difficult topics with loved ones and tools to make difficult decisions related to quality of life, advanced illness and treatment decisions. End of Life Care Coalition members will answer your questions and help you, if you are ready, to put your end of life care plan in writing.

End of Life Care Planning Workshops will be held at PRCC, 5615 N. Sanders Road, during the day on Thursdays, February 18 and February 25, from 1:00 to 4:00 p.m., and in the evening on Mondays, February 22 and February 29, from 6:00 to 8:00 p.m. Participants are encouraged to attend two sessions to complete the workshop.

The End of Life Care Planning Workshops will help you make a plan and complete your advanced directives. They are open to the public at no cost; anyone over 18 is invited to participate. Official State of Arizona forms and Five Wishes booklets and other useful tools and resources to make this important task easier to complete will be available for all participants. By planning, you make decisions that reflect your wishes for end of life care and create a guide for loved ones and health care professionals to follow.

Attendance is limited. Call 520-903-3924 to reserve a spot. The End of Life Care Coalition is dedicated to provi-ding education and resources that prepare adults to plan end of life care. Their efforts are part of the ELDER Alliance and are funded by the Shaaron Kent Endowment Fund, Community Foundation for South-ern Arizona and the United Way of Tucson and Southern Arizona.

BUILDING A COMMUNITY WEST OF TUCSON Part 1 of 4

The Avra Valley, named with an O'odham word meaning "wide," was farmed by the ancestral Huhugam peoples for thousands of years. When the southwest was conquered by Spain and became Mexico, land grants established cattle ranches that still exist today. The name of the unincorporated community of Picture Rocks comes from many ancient petroglyphs in the area, notably along the wash below the Redemptorist Renewal Center on Picture Rocks Road just east of the Tucson Mountains. That center was built in 1965.

There are about 9,000 residents in the 55 square miles of Picture Rocks, and another 4,000 in the adjacent unincorporated communities of Avra Valley and Avra Valley West. The valley is shared with ranchers like Oscar L. Garcia, whose family has run cattle here for about 200 years, and with Tucson Water and Saguaro National Park. The City of Tucson bought up many parcels in the 1970s to build settling ponds for Colorado River water to recharge the aguifer.

Tucson Water also planted a lot of non-native buffelgrass to control erosion. That invasive grass, also used for cattle forage, was later banned in Arizona as a "noxious weed." Tucson Water and neighboring Saguaro National Park are using aerial spraying to fight buffelgrass, and neighbors have been sickened and plants killed, prompting protests.

West of Picture Rocks and Avra Valley is the O'odham Nation, the second-largest reservation in the U.S., with over 4,000 square miles and over 10,000 people within its four sections. This section of the reservation was created in 1916 with Sells, then called Indian Oasis, as its center. A finger of "The Rez" reaches to Sandario Road south of Picture Rocks, creating a problem for backers of an Interstate 11 route through the Avra Valley.

Where O'odham Nation land comes to Sandario, there is only an 80-foot right-of-way (ROW) with the federal Bureau of Reclamation's Wildlife

Mitigation Corridor on the east side of the road. That corridor was established when the Central Arizona Project canal was built. I-11 needs an 800-foot ROW. I-11 backer and Pima County Administrator Chuck Huckelberry has proposed using Sandario as the base for an elevated freeway starting at Mile Wide Road to accommodate a new highway.

Feb. 27: John Zerzan is a critic of unbridled technology and the resulting "civilization" with numerous books and articles published.


March 5: Dr. Julian Kunnie is a University of Arizona Professor currently working on a prison project looking at race, class, gender, and the growing incarceration of young people of color.
